Prof. Kanchan talked about the idea of friendship from Greek philosophy to Kant and then criticized this conception from the feminist perspective.


93 students attended this lecture, including the faculty and students from Pune, Chennai and Kanpur.



Ms. Meeta Rajivlochan throws light on aspects of Women Empowerment and Challenges

As a part of Golden Jubilee Year Celebrations and Birth Centenary Year of Pujya Shri B. K. Birla ji, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) under the Scholarly Lecture Series organised Special Lecture of Ms. Meeta Rajivlochan, IAS, Member Secretary, National Commission for Women and former State Project Director, RUSA, Maharashtra on the topic "Women Empowerment: Challenge and Opportunities" on Wednesday, 11th August 2021 at 4.00 pm to 5.15 pm on digital platform of Microsoft Teams.

The program was organised for Principals, IQAC Coordinators, IQAC Members and Faculty members of Mentee Colleges and Members of IQAC and faculty members of BKBCK.

Dr. Swapna Samel, Senior Vice Principal spoke about the concept of the Program. Dr. Naresh Chandra, Director (Education), BKBCK gave welcome address and Dr. Avinash Patil, Principal, introduced the distinguished guest to the audience.

"The role of women in the past to present is changing. Women participation in economic activities is gradually increasing and things are back to the natural order. In near future women will be position maker, business women, politician as mothers and homemakers and men would gradually learn to be more civilized in their attitude towards women. The idea of subordination of women to men has become a past phenomenon. The gender gap parameter on basis of literacy, rate of women is lower than men. The position of women in society today is easy as they are progressing in various sectors like one is political empowerment, second is education then health and economic empowerment. While talking about the political empowerment. In India the women voters are 67.2 % more than men. In Panchayat Raj 33% women representation is mandatory" said Ms. Meeta Rajivlochan while beginning her talk.

She further spoke about the women education empowerment where women turn out is more than men in higher education but still there is 14.4% gender gap in literacy of men to women, due to domestic responsibilities or marriage. Ms. Meeta proudly said that 43% graduate from science and engineering are women. In health sector, the health expectancy rate of women is 77.7% as compare to men 68.2 % and women mortality is lesser than the men in 60s. The challenges in women health sector are reproductive and child health. There is structural deficiency in primary education and primary health. When we talk about women health one has to focus on domestic violence mentioned Ms. Meeta Rajivlochan. According to National Family Health Survey the domestic violence has come down from 39 % to 30 %. The immediate support to be provided to the affected people. She also emphasized the role of skills in market related to Artificial Intelligence and E-commerce and also told that IT enable services plays important role in economy. Subjects like statistics, Machine language, engineering, management are to be learned along with generic courses. In next 20 years these skills will command the market. Madam also spoke about the financial management.

The Question-and-Answer Session was taken care by Dr. Maninder Kaur Dhaliwal, Vice-Principal (Science). Many significant questions are answered satisfactorily by Madam. Formal Vote of thanks was proposed by



Padma Shri Sudharak Olwe, Documentary Photographer was the Chief Guest to throw a light on Social Documentary Photography. He was welcomed by Dr. Avinash Patil, Principal. The Chief Guest was introduced by Mrs. Ankita Malpani, Assistant Professor, Department of Mass Media. He started his talk by highlighting how he turned from a photo journalist to a documentary photographer. "I initially started my career as a photojournalist. My role was to capture the photos related to news and give a place in newspaper. But then I thought, this is not the purpose of my camera. I should use it as a weapon to highlight what is not seen by common man. And from then onwards my journey as a documentary photographer started" said Padma Shri Olwe. After the brief, he shared his pictoral works.





This story was about 40,000 conservancy workers employed by BMC. These workers collect the city's garbage, sweep the streets, clean the gutters, load and unload garbage trucks and work in the dumping grounds. They are either completely ignored or looked down upon with disgust by the rest of society. They have to work in the midst of filth, with no protective gear, not even access to water for washing off the slime. Most of them are alcoholics and live-in poverty, in dismal housing. They are perpetually in debt despite earning what, by Indian standards, is a decent wage of US \$152 per month. The workers abuse their wives and children. And when the husbands die (usually at a young age), the despised job passes to the widows. The despair continues.

After seeing the plight of conservancy workers captured by Shri Olwe, Ratan Tata started Mission Garima for these people. Through this trust they provide BMC workers the facilities for the betterment of their life. "This is an achievement for me. The work you do, needs to have some output. The workers were provided with better working and living condition" described Shri Sudharak while mentioning the impact of photography on masses.

He further called up the attention of the listeners for the malnutrition problem in India. Reed-thin arms, the swelling of oedema distorting their body, some with distended tummies, others wheezing with pneumonia, and most of them with disinterest in their eyes and lethargy in their limbs... this is the state of India's children. While they may not all be dying of starvation before our very eyes, millions of India's children are at risk of having lifelong problems because their daily diet does not support their physical and cognitive development.
